

Last year, thanks to your support of the 5th annual LES 5k Revel Run, University Settlement piloted the Pavel Lempert Fellowship Program. Seven (7) students at East Side Community High School participated in the year long, paid internship program embedded within our afterschool program. The Fellows engaged in a variety of activities during their 100-hour internship to develop key skills including organization, time management, accountability, critical thinking, dependability, and problem solving. In addition to supporting the afterschool program, the Fellows were also assigned a staff mentor, met biweekly for workshops on college and career readiness, and were active members of the Beacon Advisory Council, ensuring our youth to have a voice in important program elements.

Students also received a stipend for their hard work, a vital element to the success of this program. Students don't always have time to get a job with school and homework and many need to help at home financially. In addition to providing support for their lives, they reported it was also beneficial for them to feel a sense of independence from their parents, to feel committed and responsible for their hours, and to feel like a real staff member that was recognized for their contributions.

Last year, the Fellows engaged in the following opportunities:

- Assisted group leaders with running activities, including arts and crafts, sports, and music
- Set up and helped facilitate events such as the Health and Wellness Resource Fair, the winter clothing drive, and a food drive
- Provided administrative support including taking attendance, organizing supplies, filing student information, and data entry for our government contracts
- Tutored younger students and provided homework help
- Helped students fill out their participatory budget ballots and encouraged civic engagement

We received overwhelmingly positive feedback from last year's Fellows about their experience in the program:
